OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and Aims

The Rape and Sexual Abuse Counselling Centre (Darlington and County Durham) (RSACC) offers free confidential counselling and support to survivors who have experienced any form of sexual violence.

We work to end rape and sexual violence in Darlington and County Durham by supporting survivors of sexual violence. We offer free, safe support to anyone who has experienced any form of sexual violence at any time in their lives.

The principle charitable objects of RSACC are:

- 1 To relieve the distress of individuals in County Durham and the surrounding area who have suffered any form of sexual violence, sexual abuse, domestic abuse or harassment – in particular, but not exclusively by the following means:
 - the provision of a confidential face to face and telephone counselling service;
 - the provision of a centre specifically for women and girls needing further support;
 - (c) by referring with permission those clients needing help of a more specialist nature.

- To educate the public and undertake research into the subject of sexual abuse and to disseminate the useful results thereof.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

This year RSACC has supported 726 survivors of sexual violence across Darlington and County Durham, 322 through our Independent Sexual Advisor Service (ISVA) and 390 through our counselling service. Our Helpline has supported 425 calls and offered over 100 hours of anonymous and confidential emotional support.

The Rape & Sexual Abuse Support Fund, awarded by the Ministry of Justice is a 3-year core fund which commenced on 1st April 2019. Funded by the Ministry of Justice, this is a 3-year grant for core funding and continues to be a major contribution to our funding, including an uplift to support survivors of child sexual abuse. The Henry Smith Charity continue to fund the role of the Deputy Chief Executive and Children in Need continue to fund the post of a Young Person's Counsellor.

We have continued to see a rise in demand for support from survivors. This year we received 577 referrals, a 40% increase on the previous year. To help meet this demand we were able to increase the capacity of our counselling service through grants from the Durham Police and Crime Commissioner and the Ministry of Justice. In addition, a grant from Lloyds Bank Foundation supporting our core costs helped us to respond to this rise in demand.

We have continued to provide group based support for survivors, including our Peer Support Group in Darlington. This has been enabled by a grant from County Durham Community Foundation's Community Safety Fund. A further grant through County Durham Community Foundation's NHS Community Connector Programme has allowed us to employ a Group Coordinator to further develop and expand our group provision across the county.

The SELFIE programme (a preventative programme for young people focusing on consent and healthy relationships) which was delivered in schools and community-based settings. It was funded by the National Lottery Community Fund until March 2021, but was suspended due to the pandemic. The project was ended in December 2020 due the inability of the project to function within pandemic restrictions and the lack of funding available after March 2021. The project underspend was used this year to support adding capacity to our ISVA service and to our communications work with the agreement of the National Lottery Community Fund.

RSACC has been able to expand our communication and engagement work this year through a grant from Tyne and Wear Community Foundation's Growth and Resilience Fund. This has allowed us to employ a Communications and Engagement Officer to focus on raising our profile, developing a group of supporters and increasing our income from fundraising. This work has seen us run a number of campaigns to raise awareness of sexual violence locally and increase our income from donations, ultimately enabling us to support more survivors.

RSACC continue to deliver specialist sexual violence counselling as part of the Durham Sexual Assault Support Pathway. This contract is commissioned by Durham Police and Crime Commissioner, until October 2022, and represents a small proportion of our total counselling provision. We also continue to deliver the ISVA service, funded by Durham Police and Crime Commissioner and this year have been able to recruit an additional 4 ISVAs to the service. This has significantly increased the services capacity to provide emotional and practical support to survivors, including those going through the criminal justice system. This is particularly important as the impact of the pandemic has led to long delays in the criminal justice system meaning survivors are often needing more intense support for longer. Demand for both ISVA support and counselling has continued to grow this year beyond the capacity of our services.

RSACC's relationship with Durham University has continued and we are contracted by the University to provide specialist sexual violence counselling to staff and students. We also continue to deliver regular external workshops on sexual violence throughout the colleges at Durham University.

During the financial year RSACC has worked with 8 volunteers who have supported our Helpline, Live Chat and counselling service. The support from volunteers is invaluable and has enabled us to continue to run our Helpline in the challenging context of increasing demand. We have seen a drop in the number of volunteers this year, as many are unable to volunteer remotely or priorities have changed. We have a plan in place to increase volunteer numbers over the next financial year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves Policy

The trustees have set a reserves policy which requires:-

- Reserves to be maintained at a level which ensures 6 months organisation core activity could continue during a
 period of unforeseen difficulty.
- RSACC will provide goodwill in respect of 8 weeks gross redundancy pay for staff in existing roles (funding permitting) in circumstances where the statutory requirement is less; otherwise the statutory requirement applies.
- A proportion of reserves be maintained in a readily realisable form.

The charity made a deficit of £9,951 (2021: Surplus £28,177) during the year on unrestricted funds and a deficit of £14,775 (2021: surplus of £109,631) on restricted funds before transfers. At the year end the restricted funds stood at £99,788 (2021: £117,285) and the unrestricted funds were £392,676 (2021: £385,130).

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Rape and Sexual Abuse Counselling Centre (Darlington and County Durham) CIO was incorporated on 26 October 2015 (registered charity number 1164121) and the assets and liabilities of the unincorporated charity which totalled £223,519 were transferred to the CIO on 31 March 2016.

Overall management for the charity is the responsibility of the trustees. The trustees collectively are responsible for ensuring that RSACC is well run, that resources are managed responsibly, and that services are in line with RSACC's objectives. The trustees are responsible for appointing a CEO, Isabel Owens, who is responsible for leading and managing RSACC's service delivery and income generation activities.

Governing document

The Charitable Incorporated Organisation's governing document is its constitution which was registered on the 26 October 2015 and adopted on 1 April 2016.

Appointment, induction and training of trustees

Trustees are identified by both open and targeted recruitment aimed at ensuring an appropriate balance of skills and experience. Apart from the first charity trustees, every trustee must be appointed for a term of three years by a resolution passed at a properly convened meeting of the charity trustees. Trustees are required to undertake annual training.

The members of the CIO at any point in time shall be the same persons as its charity trustees at that time. The only persons eligible to be members of the CIO are its charity trustees. Membership of the CIO cannot be transferred to anyone else.

Board Meetings

The Trustees hold Board Meetings every 6-8 weeks where key decisions around governance are made and recorded in the minutes. Any decisions taken more urgently within this timeframe are evidenced and included in the minutes at the following meeting. The Board must be quorate for decisions to be valid. A forward plan of agenda items is maintained to ensure that the trustees regularly consider all aspects of RSACC strategic and operational activity.

Arrangements for setting pay of key management personnel

Pay increases are discussed and approved by the Board in preparation for the financial year.

Risk Management

The principal risks to the charity are outlined in the RSACC Risk Register. A review of the Risk Register is a standing agenda item at all Board meetings. Sustainability always features as a significant risk in terms of loss of funding due to the high percentage of short-term funding streams and contracts. RSACC has an ongoing funding strategy and action plan to mitigate the loss of funding.

Future Plans

Our future plans are outlined in the current RSACC Business Plan; a 3-year plan launched in July 2019. The plan covers delivery in 5 main areas of improvement and development; Innovation, Quality Service Provision & Governance, Accessibility, Campaign & Educate and Sustainability. Progress against the delivery plan is discussed as a standing agenda item at Board Meetings.

Our greatest challenge continues to be demand for support from survivors across the county. Referrals for support from RSACC increased by 40% this year compared to the previous year. Demand is particularly high for counselling, we are the only specialist sexual violence provider in the area that provides long term person centred counselling. In the coming years we need build the capacity within our counselling team to meet this need.

We are working to develop services that meet the diverse needs of survivors, for example introducing more group support and specialist ISVA roles focusing on survivors with disabilities, older survivors and LGBTQ+ survivors. In addition we are working to develop new volunteering roles which allow volunteers to support survivors and the organisation in new ways, for example through campaigning. Over the coming year we will continue this work to ensure we can truly meet the needs of survivors across Darlington and County Durham.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) General information and basis of preparation

Rape and Sexual Abuse Counselling Centre is a charitable incorporated organisation in England. The principal address is given in the Charity information on page 1 of these financial statements. The nature of activities are shown in the Trustees' Report.

The Charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice Standard applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) published in October 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair view'. This departure has involved following the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102 published in October 2019 rather than the accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the Charity and rounded to the nearest £1.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

(b) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

(c) Income

Items of income are recognised and included in the accounts when all the following criteria are met:

- The charity have entitlement to the funds.
- Any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met or are fully within
 the control of the charity.
- There is sufficient certainty that receipt of the income is considered probable; and
- The amount can be measured reliably.

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract or where entitlement to grant funding is subject to specific performance conditions. There is no netting off within the accounts.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2022

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

(d) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. It includes attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the company in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Support costs are those that assist the work of the charity but do not directly represent charitable activities and include office and governance costs.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity which are associated with the constitutional and statutory requirements.

(e) Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost, less depreciation. Assets costing less than £250 are not capitalised.

Depreciation is provided at the following rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets over their expected useful live:-

Office Equipment

- Equipment

- 33% on cost per annum

- Fixtures and Fittings

- 25% on cost per annum

(f) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount.

(g) Cash at bank

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

(h) Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount.

(i) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

(j) Taxation

The charity is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

(k) Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

(l) Redundancy payments

Redundancy payments are recognised when where is a constructive liability to make the payment.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

(m) Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.
